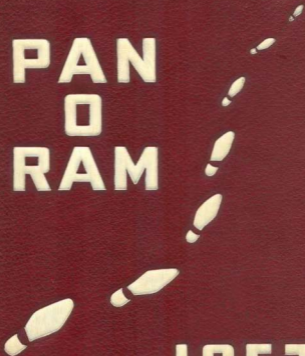

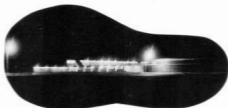
Mr. Thompson raises the flag, which was a gift to the school from the class of '56.

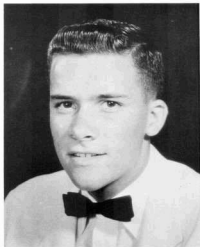


Inez Koster

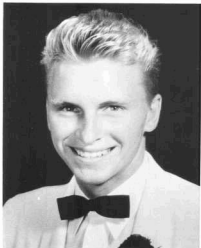

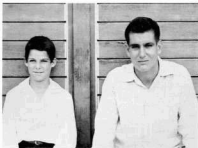

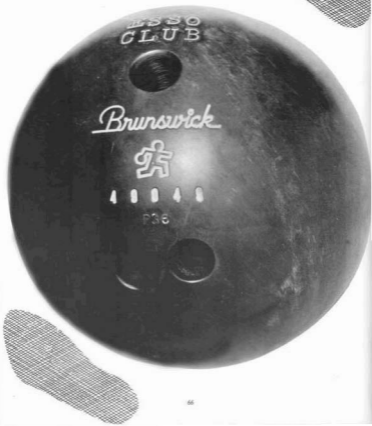
