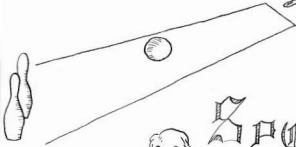
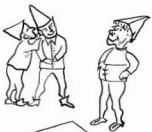
The Camera Club got off to a good start this year with a large membership and an air-conditioner for the dark-room.

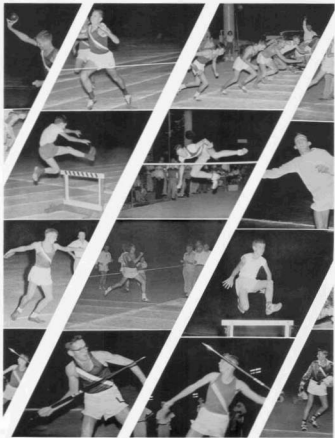
